An organization's mission defines its purpose and inspires its goals. It also directs decision-making around fundraising. As museums and heritage organizations search for revenue from a diversity of sources, a clearly-defined mission statement, with a plan for adhering closely to it, is the best path to achieving financial success. This workshop will address the importance of mission to successful fundraising, grant writing, programs and events. During our time together, participants will examine their mission statements, work on strengthening what their organization's do best, and create a simple action plan that identifies their next steps.

Presenter Biography:



In a career spanning four decades, Anne Ackerson served as director of several historic house museums and historical societies in central and eastern New York, the director of the Museum Association of New York, and the executive director of the national Council of State Archivists.

In 1997 Anne began an independent consulting practice focusing on organizational development issues for the smaller nonprofit cultural institution. In this capacity, she has worked with a wide variety of cultural and heritage organizations ranging from museums to arts councils to orchestras and community theatres. Among the range of projects with which Anne has been involved

include organizational assessment, board development, assisting with executive search, evaluating membership and annual giving programs, and strategic, business and master planning. She facilitated the planning for a consortium of eleven Albany, New York-area history museums and historic sites as they worked together to create new ways to collaboratively attract heritage tourism.

Anne is a frequent workshop presenter and author, focusing on issues of board and organizational development, governance issues, and planning. She writes about management and leadership issues for cultural institutions in her blog, Leading by Design (http://leadingbydesign.blogspot.com). She is a regular webinar presenter on issues of museum ethics, leadership, financial management, and board roles and responsibilities. She developed curriculum materials and a webinar on strategic planning for the American Association of State and Local History's StEPS program, a national standards program for history museums. She teaches AASLH's Small Museum Pro online course on museum leadership and administration and recently co-taught a course on leadership for the Johns Hopkins University museum studies graduate program.

Her article about the status of heritage organizations in New York State, "The History Museum in New York State: A Growing Sector Built on Scarcity Thinking," was published in the Summer 2011 issue of the journal, Public Historian. She is the co-author with Joan Baldwin of the second edition of Leadership Matters: Leading Museums in an Age of Discord, which was published this summer by Rowman & Littlefiend as part of the American Association for State and Local History series. Anne and Baldwin's book, Women in the Museum: Lessons from the Workplace, was published by Routledge in summer 2017.
