2017 Highlights

We've been busy this year, completing a number of travel tools that celebrate some of our region's gems. Through our multimedia itineraries on our websites—such as our unique mobileresponsive, drama-filled audio tours called **PassagePorts**—visitors and local residents can explore the landscape with engaging travel experiences that create emotional connections—prompting them to share their stories with others and return.

HISTORY Explore the Turning Point Trail

This PassagePort leads visitors from Plattsburgh to Saratoga, in the footsteps of charismatic British General John Burgoyne, whose fateful decisions led to the "turning point of the American



Revolution." This journey is no boring history lesson. It is a story about the land and the people who traveled through the New York wilderness in the summer and fall of 1777. A story of battles, ambushes,

smoldering ambitions, disastrous miscommunication, fierce allegiance, true love, venomous snakes, and narrow escapes—all with courteous gentlemanly conduct.

With the help of navigational tools and drama-filled audio, visitors will drive through the storied landscape of the 18th century, stopping at 32 sites that played a pivotal role in the story. As part of the Turning Point Trail project, seven kiosks and five interpretive signs can be found along the route, providing additional information. Visit passageport.org/turning-point.

RECREATION Paddle the Lake Champlain Blueway Trail

Explore all of New York's Lake Champlain shoreline with our Lake Champlain Blueway Trail. A recreational water path that extends from Rouses Point south to Whitehall, the Lake Champlain



Blueway Trail guides paddlers along more than 90 points of interests—such as parks, wildlife viewing spots, geological curiosities, historic sites, museums, and campgrounds. The

online travel guide weaves historical information, recreational opportunities, paddling tips, boat launches, and marinas. The Blueway Trail is organized into 16 separate day trips. You can find it at www.lakestolocks.org under "Featured Trips."

A companion travel tool is the Valcour and Crab Islands PassagePort (passageport.org/valcour). This online audio tour identifies launch and landing points, potential hazards, noteworthy historic sites, natural areas and wildlife viewing, and communities with food, lodging, and shopping—even tips on how to enjoy these places in the winter!

THE ROAD TO THE BATTLE OF BENNINGTON



is the anatomy of a disastrous event. In August of 1777 Lieutenant Colonel Friedrich Baum, under orders from British General John Burgoyne, led a raid on a supply depot in Bennington, VT. As you retrace Baum's ill-fated

journey to the Battle of Bennington, you experience a powerful story while you travel through a stunning landscape.

THE STORY OF IRON IN CROWN POINT AND MORIAH

is a journey that brings the heyday of the iron industry alive with the sights and sounds of blast furnaces, forges, streams of freight trains, crews of immigrant miners, and free-wheeling industrialists.

A JOURNEY TO LAKE GEORGE

brings to life Seneca Ray Stoddard's *Lake George Illustrated 1873*. The PassagePort captures Stoddard's eloquent word and image and connects them to what exists today. Stoddard helped put the Adirondacks on the map with his guidebooks and images, some of the first images people had ever seen of the Lake George region.

PETER KALM: A NATURALIST'S TRAVELS INTO NORTH AMERICA

allows you to join Kalm, protégé of the famed scientist Carl Linnaeus, on his journey between Albany and Lake Champlain and examine the landscape through his eyes. Along the way, you will hear little-known stories about this wilderness—America's first frontier.

Funding for our PassagePorts, itinerary development, and websites was provided by grants from Empire State Development, the National Scenic Byway Program through NYS Department of Transportation, a grant from New York State Council on the Arts with the support of Governor Andrew Cuomo and the New York State Legislature, New York State Department of State with funds provided under Title 11 of the Environmental Protection Fund Act, the Alfred Z. Solomon Charitable Trust, Stewarts Shops, and the Washington County Historical Society.

Celebrating Heritage, Connecting Communities

Vibrant communities—those with thriving economies and cultural institutions—are the ones that embrace their heritage. It is an expression of community pride to improve quality of



life and invest in the future. To foster this stewardship, Lakes to Locks Passage works to build a network of nonprofit community organizations, museums, libraries, and cultural groups along the byway to bring a seamless travel experience based on shared heritage.

To further that effort, Lakes to Locks Passage, Inc. has partnered with the National Geographic Society to capture the history and

heritage of the Lakes to Locks Passage region through an interactive website www.lakestolocks.org. History buffs and adventurers, backpackers and foodies, birders and sightseers can discover unique destinations based on recommendations from those who know best—residents of the Lakes to Locks Passage region.



GUIDEBOOK The Turning Point of the American Revolution

Lakes to Locks Passage has completed the third in the series of Waterways of War guidebooks. *Waterways of War: The Turning Point of the American Revolution* focuses on the 1777 northern



campaign of British General John Burgoyne. The book is part of a broader initiative to develop the Turning Point Trail, a narrated driving tour from Plattsburgh to Albany. (See "History:

Explore the Turning Point Trail.") This project was funded by the American Battlefield Protection Program.

GATEWAY VISITOR CENTERS Whitehall and Schuylerville

Lakes to Locks Passage is working with the Town and Village of Whitehall, NYS Canal Corporation, NYS Department of Environmental Conservation, and Friends of the Washington



County Grasslands Important Bird Area (IBA) to transform the Whitehall Canal Pavilion into a Gateway Visitor Center. Static exhibits and multimedia venues with digital

technology—touchscreen monitors, video and audio productions—will promote Whitehall and surrounding communities as the eastern New York hub for birding, recreation, and nature tourism.

Another project in development is the Canal Region Gateway Visitor Center in Schuylerville. Led by the Historic Hudson-Hoosic Rivers Partnership, the project will feature exhibits that tell the important military history of the region and how the Champlain Canal influenced the economic and social fabric of the communities. Funding for this project was provided by a grant from Empire State Development and the National Scenic Byway Program through NYS Department of Transportation.

BROCHURES / WEBSITE For Our French-Speaking Visitors

New brochures for the Lake Champlain, Lake George, and Champlain Canal regions are available for our English and French-speaking visitors. The brochures include an illustrated map highlighting noteworthy attractions and contact information for



marinas, parks, hiking trails, museums, and other points of interest. In addition, a new website, www. museedelacsauecluses. com provides travelers a French translation of Heritage Center exhibits and PDFs of the brochures that have been translated into French. 2016-2017 Annual Report Financials

In 2012, Congress withdrew financial support for the National Scenic Byway Program so we had to take a hard look at our future. From 2002 through 2016, the majority of funding to the organization has been through federal and state grant programs, primarily the FHWA National Scenic Byway Program, administered through the NYS Department of Transportation.

In December 2016, the Board updated the organization's Mission, Vision, and Goals; Transition in Leadership Plan; and Development Plan. Financial support has shifted from primarily grant-based funding to a diverse group of private and public sources. A key component is providing fee for services to municipalities and other organizations as well as foundations and corporations for partnership projects.

Heritage Center Programs & Trainings

In 2007, with state and federal funding, Lakes to Locks Passage partnered with the Essex County Historical Society to provide professional development training for staff and volunteers at



cultural organizations across the county. The pilot project was designed to build collaborations between museums and cultural organizations. Trainings focused on building

strong governance, creating programs and exhibits, community outreach, and building new leadership. The project culminated in the "Lakes to Locks Passage Heritage Center Strategy."

Since then, Lakes to Locks has offered several dozen workshops and roundtables at various locations along the byway. This past spring, we organized two workshops: "Planning and Designing Exhibits" and "Fundraising is Fun."
