
The Rokeby Museum

The visitor center tells the story of military life atop the Mount during the pivotal years of 1776-1777. A privately-operated tour boat, the M/V Carillon, docks at Mt. Independence and offers 1.5 hour cruises.

ESSEX, NY

Essex Historic Hamlet

The entire hamlet of Essex is on the National Register of Historic Places. Founded in 1765, it is one of the area's earliest European settlements and it contains one of the most intact collections of pre-Civil War architecture in America. WESTPORT, NY

Coon Mountain A 2-mile easy roundtrip hike on Adirondack Land Trust Preserve, Coon Mountain is famous for its mysterious and craggy interior with rocky outcrops and hemlock forests. MORIAH, NY

Belfry Mountain

A 0.6 mile easy roundtrip walk along a utility truck road leads to the summit where there are views of Lake Champlain, abandoned iron mines, and mountains. The trailhead located on Dalton Hill Road, about 5 miles west of Port Henry. Park on the road, please do not block the gate. Port Henry Walking Tour

The Port Henry Walking tour

is a self guided walk that consists of four loops-Park Place, Powerhouse Park, Cedar Point, and Downtown -which explore Port Henry's historic architectural district and Moriah's industrial legacy. The first three loops relate to the mining and railroad history of Port Henry. The fourth loop is a 30- to 45- minute architectural walking tour of downtown Port Henry. Crown Point State Historic Site

WINOOSKI, VT

Winooski Nature Trail

A 1.4-mile walk along the Winooski River and atop its dramatic cliffs provides a vivid history from 3000 B.C. to the industrial-era mills at the falls. BURLINGTON, VT

Intervale

The Intervale of Burlington. located on Intervale Road in the Winooski River delta at the north end of Burlington, is a unique natural area of the city. Walking trails, farm roads and unpaved bike paths give walkers access to the Winooski River, its fertile delta and a wide array of organic agricultural projects. Burlington Bike Path

A 7.6-mile, multi-use. paved bike path stretches the length of Burlington, mostly along the Lake Champlain shoreline. Fabulous views of the lake and Adirondacks, as well as access to the South Burlington Bike Path, Red Rocks Park, Ethan Allen Park, Ethan Allen Homestead, the Intervale, the Island Line Rail-Trail and Oakledge Park. East Woods

Red Rocks Park

Allen Hill/ Shelburne Bay Park

Shelburne Farms

Eight miles of trails through a working landscape of field and forest, magnificent lake and mountain views. LaPlatte River Marsh

A 1.75-mile trail through marsh and woodlands. along McCabe's Brook near its confluence with Shelburne Bay. The Nature Conservancy manages the property and provides maps at a trailhead kiosk. Parking is across Bay Road at the fishing access.

CHARLOTTE, VT

Charlotte Park and Wildlife Refuge

This park offers several miles of trails through working farmland and woods, with beautiful views. A map is available at the trailhead, near the intersection of Lake and Greenbush Roads.



Mount Philo State Park

A one mile paved road plus steep walking paths lead the walker to the top of a 968-foot hill with panoramic views of the Champlain valley. Great wildflowers and hawkviewing opportunities. A map is provided with admission. Mount Philo State Park: 802-425-2390.

Button Bay State Park

FERRISBURGH, VT

Button Bay State Park is located on Button Bay Road, just south of Basin Harbor and 6 miles west of Vergennes. It offers a 1.6-mile walk which passes beneath huge old trees. Several fossils, some over 500 million years old, are visible from the nature trail. Panoramic lake and Adirondack views await the walker. A map is provided with admission: 802-475-2377.

Kingsland Bay State Park

Kingsland Bay State Park, located on Hawkins Road about 5 miles from Route 7, offers a 0.6-mile nature trail around the peninsula of MacDonough point.
